

Syllabus for Qualifying Written Test for direct recruitment of Assistant Professor in the subject of Law.

1. **Note:-**The Qualifying Written Test will be of Maximum 100 Marks and duration of the test will be 03 hours. The Question paper of written test will comprise of 50 Objective (multiple choice questions of 50 marks) & 05 subjective questions (50 marks). There will be 10 subjective questions (02 from each Unit) and the candidate will be required to attempt 05 Questions (selecting one from each unit). "Candidate have to secure 60 marks out of 100 (55marks for SC/ST Candidate) subject to 50% marks (45% marks for SC/ST candidate) from each section i.e. MCQ and Subjective part of the paper to qualify the written test".
